Jess and his wife, Carol, have been married for nearly 30 years. They have two grown children, Joshua and Jennifer, and three "absolutely beautiful" granddaughters. When he's not working, Jess enjoys working on and driving classic cars and serving as director of the Wise Guys Car Club, which helps put on the annual Chrome on the Creek car show in Asotin. The same skills he uses to work on "hot rods" apply to his work as a millwright, a position he's held since 1995. *"Millwrights are the fix-anything mechanics of an industrial plant. Jess is particularly fond of the "team" aspect of his job.

"I've been tasked to invent things that either don't exist or are quite frankly too expensive if built off-plant to have a return, so it is done in-house as a team. ... There is very little our team can't do."
