How we connect is vital to our lives, from our personal contacts to our ability to do business, access healthcare, educate, and communicate beyond the limits of transportation. While for many of us this is a given, rural communities who lack the infrastructure needed for a quality, highspeed network are at a disadvantage.

Since 2015, the Port of Lewiston has worked to close that gap, constructing miles of fiber infrastructure accessible to all service providers, allowing them to provide low-cost, high-speed internet to residents and businesses. The Port has currently installed nearly 55 miles of fiber optic network within Nez Perce County.

These efforts were expanded in 2021, when federal grant dollars gave rise to the Middle Mile project, which is building approximately 95 miles of open access fiber optic line to service north central Idaho. The project will create a fiber connection from Moscow to Lewiston and on to Grangeville.

"As a port, our mission is to promote economic growth and development in our region. Without high-speed internet, that growth is difficult," said Port of Lewiston General Manager Scott Corbitt. "Constructing fiber optic infrastructure is a great way to serve our communities."
