The A. Neil DeAtley Career Technical Education Center has already provided a lift to regional businesses, and it's not slated to open until this fall.

Roughly 59 percent of the bids for construction of the CTE building and the new Lewiston High School went to local contractors, according to Dr. Kimberley Eimers, Director of Student Services for the Lewiston School District.

Valley Vision Executive Director Karl Dye said the center will continue to benefit regional businesses for years to come by providing handson career and technical training and coursework for Idaho high school students from throughout Region II, which includes Nez Perce, Latah, Idaho, Clearwater and Lewis counties. The center will have a "soft" opening this fall, Eimers said, even though the building won't be completely finished until the fall 2020 semester MADE begins.

The center is being built alongside the new LHS and was made possible by a \$59.8 million bond approved by voters in 2017. The CTE Center is named after the late A. Neil DeAtley, a 1955 LHS graduate who owned and operated DeAtley Crushing Service.


